

INSURANCE.... Don't set and forget

About20 YEARS ON!

Over the past two months, the **About.....** has been celebrating twenty years since its first edition was published. This month we continue this historical reflection, beginning with a mention of the April 2014 edition. This was Volume 11, Issue 3 since Volume 1,



Issue 1 was published in August 2003. By this stage, **About**..... had matured somewhat, with much colour splashed all over the Front Cover of that edition as the Sanctuary Point & Districts Community Bank celebrated its 10th BIRTHDAY. It had by then taken on the appearance of a small magazine, yet was still published in an A5 size.

VOLUME TWO Back when the 2nd Volume of **About**...... editions began to be published in August 2004, the "community newsletter, produced as a community service, for our community" had expanded to 32 A5 sized pages. In that month, a second splash of colour was added to the black & white texts of stories, community information, photos, advertisements and monthly notices. This came in the form of a blue birthday cake with one candle on it. This was superimposed over a list of THANKS on the front page. These thanks were due to various aspects of OUR community's efforts which helped establish **About**..... as the promotional arm of a Bendigo Bank branch establishment in Sanctuary Point.

Volume 2 Issue 1 in August 2004 was exactly a year since the very first edition of **About**...... was published. During that time, the opening of the Sanctuary Point Bendigo Bank branch had taken place on Monday 5th April, 2004. The front cover of Volume 1 Issue 8 that month announced this and the "OFFICIAL OPENING!" which took place the very next day. For this significant event, "the excitement will begin early and continue throughout the day" "Following several weeks of solid preparation and training, manager Keith Robinson and his team are ready to go!" announced that front cover

This cover also had a photo of the bank staff who were to give "real customer service as our bank opens doors for business". In the photo above, they were listed LEFT to RIGHT: Lynne Quinn, Mark Bowmaker, Heather Cartwright, Keith Robinson and Narelle MacGillivray.

After close to two decades of editorials written in the **About**......* by Keith as manager of the local Bendigo Community Bank branch, he retired from work. As a testament to his commitment to the Sanctuary Point & Districts community, Keith still maintains an editorial role in the publication of each **About**.....*. He is also the current chair of the board of directors for the franchise company responsible for the financial management of the branch, having taken on this role in the last two years since his retirement as branch manager.

At the end of 2004, Volume 2 of **About**..... published a second Christmas edition. Once again, it featured a dash of colour to celebrate.

This time green was the chosen colour, with a superimposed face of Santa Claus being joined by a Christmas tree and some bells. The back cover had a large Christmas tree and some sprigs of holly superimposed over an article on Sun Safety, and how best to use sunscreen, with the arrival of the summer holidays imminent.

By the time the 3rd Volume of **About** Issues brought in the New Year, our publication had grown to 40 pages by March 2005. Two initiatives during this period were celebrated. A 'GREAT YOUTH REPORTING COMPETITION' began in the February edition, for which those of a school age could "in approximately 100 words or less write and tell us About your local activity. The winner each month will receive a certificate and a \$10 towards a youth saver account". Our following March 2005 edition issue was highlighted with Sanctuary Point Library celebrating its 10th birthday. Its doors had opened for borrowing in February 1995, before an official opening was conducted by Shoalhaven City Council Mayor Max Atkins in May of the same year.

The 1st birthday for the bank branch on 6th April 2005 was celebrated in the April 2005 issue. The **About.....** community newsletter was now being delivered to 9,000 homes across the Bay & Basin area, and by the June Issue in this 3rd Volume, the publication had again grown – to 52 pages. The first community bank branch grants had been announced to assist local students further their tertiary education pursuits. The scope of the **About.....** also reached over the Currambene Creek, with Falls Creek residents then able to become readers by picking up copies from Falls Creek Public School.

TIME FLIES.... IT'S TWO YEARS

On the front cover of the August 2005 issue of **About.....** this above statement was the headline, below is the summary that followed that headline:

"The driving force for those who made up the Steering Committee of the Community Bank Project was, without doubt, the idea that the project would eventually deliver serious and meaningful benefits to this community. This is what would make it different, and this is why so many people were prepared to put so much time, energy, and resources into the project. In 2003, knowing full well that the banking operation would take some time to be put in place, developing and establishing, the committee applied itself to what could be done in the meantime to benefit the community at large, and to reflect the Community Bank philosophy.

Out of those deliberations grew this very newsletter which is now embarking on its third year of publication. It has grown steadily from 4,500 copies to over 9,000 copies per month.

Anecdotal evidence suggests that it is successfully meeting its objectives by supporting local businesses, providing a forum for community news, providing a vehicle for community events and articles of interest.

About also supports local service groups who undertake some of the distribution. St Georges Basin Scouts through co-ordinator David Bentley, St Georges Basin Little As, and St Georges Basin Rural Fire Service with Michelle Thornley co-ordinating, are prominent among these groups organising the distribution of the published copies each month. Peter and Sue Wild at Pin Point Advertising were also early co-ordinators of About distributions.

The Directors who instigated this effort are proud to identify **About.....** as the very first community initiative associated with the Community Bank. There will be others, but this was the first.

The criterion for embarking on, and continuing to support this newsletter, is that it remains consistent with the wider community banking philosophy. It must be about, and of benefit to, the local community. It should deal with local topics and widely involve the local community. Two years on, we are confident that this is being achieved and will continue to do so for a long time to come."

With such a solid foundation for the Sanctuary Point & Districts Community Bank Branch being established through a dedicated network of volunteers, directors, shareholders and community ambassadors, all of the latter supported the financial base which allowed the About from Day One to be distributed FREE each month to so many homes and businesses throughout the Bay & Basin. Peter Spencer at Sanctuary Point Printing had been personally invited by Bob Jones

(a significant founding member of the Bendigo Bank branch's steering committee) to handle the production of **About.....*** from Day One of its publication.

To this day, EVERY volume of **About**..... has been published by Peter's printing presses, and he also remains the longest Community Ambassador, having paid for the advertising of his business in this publication since its inception.

About° 20 YEARS ON!

EDITORS

When it began its existence, About was being operated by a steering committee consisting of Bob Jones, Rex Elliott and Russell Tait. Rex had previously been involved in the production of a community newsletter in the Gulgong area of the NSW Central West Districts, and his own home along Sanctuary Point Road was often a focal point for the collection of pieces created by contributors in these early years of the About

Bob Jones was a key driving force in the establishment of both the steering committees for the community bank, and well as being a passionate advocate for the establishment of the community newsletter to promote a Bendigo Bank branch, located in the Sanctuary Point shops. One of his favourite sayings remembered by all who worked closely when editing the About with him was to "let the page breathe". In other words, do not crowd too much information on to a single page.

Bob Jones was always proud of convincing his fellow steering committee members to go with the name **About**.....* for this publication. Ever mindful of being located adjacent to a large waterway, as many of us are aware, the term **About**.....* is used in sailing on waterways to describe when someone, singularly or as part of a team (known as a crew), wants to change direction while sailing their vessel.

With both St Georges Basin and Jervis Bay being

the Bay & Basin, About our families, and About the future direction of the social capital being created in the local community. With a background of running an established business in workplace training, basely mainly in Canberra, Bob Jones was the initial editor of the About

Bernie continued as the Editor until July 2007, with Vala Hanns having helped by co-ordinating the advertising side of the publication from April up to that point.

August 2007 signalled the return of Bob Jones to the Editor's role of **About***. Bob by this stage was the Chair of the Board for the local Bendigo Bank branch franchise, so he only intended to be Editor until a replacement could be found for Bernie Cusack.

October 2007 – several months on, Margaret McAuley took on the Editor/Co-ordinator position, and continued in this role until November 2008. After Bob had been a mentor for Margaret during this period, he once again resumed the full-time duties as Editor when the last December issue was published for 2008. This incarnation of Bob Jones as Editor lasted for the next 18 months.

June 2010 saw Paul Schillings take on the editorial duties of **About......** He too continued for a similar period in a full-time capacity in the role.

2012 saw Noel Burke take the reigns of the Editors position for a period of 12 months. Noel was very thorough and each issue was scanned with a fine tooth comb for punctuation.

2014 saw Conrad Dawe take the role on. Con enjoyed the role but as the role as Editor was growing the franchise company by this stage made an in-principle decision that it would not continue to rely on a single volunteer to co-ordinate all of the material being submitted for each monthly publication of About Part of the thinking behind this decision was the size of the publication was now more like a magazine than the 16 page A5 size community newsletter that it had commenced its existence almost a decade before.

From late 2015 onwards, the editorial role for compiling each month's **About.....** has been a team effort consisting of Keith Robinson, Veronica Husted and Michelle Graham. For much of this period, as was stated earlier in this supplement, Keith maintained his position as manager of this Bendigo Community Bank Branch until his retirement from full-time work in recent years. Veronica has been an integral member of various Bay & Basin community groups while the **About.....** has existed.

Apart from her contribution in an editorial capacity to this publication, her commitment to the franchise company of the Sanctuary Point & Districts Community Bank Branch saw her in the peak position of Chair of its Board of Directors until the past two years when she relocated out of the area to live. Now based in the small town of Howlong in the Murray River Valley District west of Albury/Wodonga, About* readers who know Veronica well will not be surprised to know that she maintains an interest in this area by continuing to contribute to her About* editorial role, proofreading many of the contributions that are made to our community's magazine.

Michelle's role on the editorial team has grown in proportion to the length of time she has been employed at Sanctuary Point Printing. When About began, Gail Burne was working at the printery as a secretary for Peter Spencer's business. When she left this role, Michelle has worked in this position from 2007, and onwards till today. She remains in the printery office three days a week in her paid work, combining her time in this role co-ordinating the editing of About with many other tasks behind her desk.



was nicknamed as 'Reverend' Rex by a barman at the St Georges

of Sanctuary Point Printing's proprietor Peter Spencer. Rex's idea
was the seed on which About was to germinate. He
later had a Garden of Reflection named after him at the Coastal

WHAT LIES BEYOND MOROCCO

Exotic names such as Fes, Casablanca and Marrakesh are names that have found their way into minds of people who want to experience this wonderful, most northwesterly land of Africa, which borders both the Atlantic Ocean and the Mediterranean Sea.

The country is distinguished by its Berber, Arabian and European cultural influences in everything from architecture, food, music and everyday life. The palaces are grand, the markets are comprised of huge, open spaces filled to the brim with stalls of ceramics and textiles, rugs and carpets, jewellery, foods and spices, local artisanal products and the occasional snake charmers – cobras in baskets on the ground while the handlers charm them after they have been taken out and placed on the ground.

The Medina, the old walled part of Marrakesh contains narrow streets, fountains, palaces, souks and mosques within winding mazes masquerading as alleyways that you can only walk through as they are too narrow for motorised vehicles. Sellers hang out of the doorway of their shops and beckon you inside to view their wares and bargain for a good price. You'll be given a glass of mint tea and made to sit down as they employ all their influence to sell you whatever it is that is their specialty.

The people are very cordial and inviting, but sellers can be pushy at times if they feel your interest in their wares is waning. In order not to be trapped into buying something that you never intended, avoid the temptation of being pulled into their stores in the first place. But I must say that it is hard, as what they sell is so

different to what we normally would buy as souvenirs from the west. Colour and sounds, scent of incense linger in the air and lets you know that you are no longer in the western world.

The Atlas Mountains which lends its name to the Atlantic Ocean, separates the Sahara Desert from the Mediterranean Sea and the Ocean itself. Inhabited by the Berbers, this mountain range is very rich in natural resources. The roads through the mountain range can be through palm-lined valleys which house the mud-built Berber villages, forested slopes, waterfalls, gorges and large rock outcrops.

To walk on the ever-shifting sands of the famed Sahara Desert on dunes that can be over 180 metres high, at times with the wind battering every inch of your body, at other times, calm as but always hot..... hot and hot..... had always been a dream of mine.

Experiencing this land of ancient traditions and resilience is truly a once-in-a-lifetime event that should really open your mind to how the-other-half lives.



Potato and Beef Croquettes

courtesy of Australian Home Cooks

INGREDIENTS

- 1kg sebago potatoes, peeled, chopped
- 1/2 cup plain flour, plus extra for dusting
- 2 eggs
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 large brown onion, finely chopped

- 250g beef mince
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 2 tbsp finely chopped fresh coriander leaves
- 2 tbsp currants
- 2 cups dried panko breadcrumbs
- Vegetable oil, for shallow frying

METHOD

- Place potatoes in a large saucepan. Boil till tender. Drain well and mash potatoes. Add flour and 1 egg. Stir until well combined. Transfer to a heatproof bowl. Cool completely.
- 2. Heat oil in a frying pan, add onion, cook stirring for 3 minutes or until softened. Add mince, cook, stirring with a wooden spoon to break up mince, for 5 minutes or until browned. Add tomato paste, coriander and currants, cook stirring for 30 seconds. Remove from heat, cool for 10 minutes.
- 3. Dust hands well with flour. Using 1/4 cup of potato mixture at a time, flatten in the palm of your hand to form a disc. Place 1 tbsp of mince mixture in centre of potato round. Bring edge together around mince mixture and roll to enclose filling forming a sausage shape. Repeat with remaining potato and meat mixtures to make 12 croquettes.
- 4. Place breadcrumbs in a shallow dish. Lightly beat remaining egg in a bowl. Dip croquettes, 1 at a time in egg, then roll in breadcrumb mixture, pressing firmly to coat. Place on a large baking tray. Cover. Refrigerate for 1 hour or until firm.
- 5. Pour enough oil into a large, deep heavy-based frying pan to come 5mm up side of pan. Heat over medium heat until hot. Cook croquettes, in batches, for 3 to 5 minutes or until golden. Transfer to a large baking tray lined with paper towel. Serve.

It is hard not to lose patience with some crops at this time of the year. The broad beans, garlic and spuds are all doing 'what they do' but they are taking their time, taking up space. Sarsaparilla (smilax ornata) Brad Wilson, herbalist

Dark Brew If you think of sarsaparilla you might immediately think of that black looking soft drink that nobody buys at the supermarket, but sarsaparilla is actually a plant, not a drink; a tropical climber with little red berries and prickly thorns.

Sarsaparilla root has been used for centuries for many ailments as diverse as syphilis, psoriasis and rheumatism. The traditional way to test its efficacy is to taste the root. Apparently, the worse it tastes the better it works. The root can be beaten and boiled to make a hot drink, or you may prefer it cold from the fridge. Others like it with ice cream and a paper straw. Yes, we are all different.

"Sars" seems to have a poor reputation. It's bittersweet and brewed like beer but contains no alcohol. Who would drink it? All the tough kids drank it when I was at school. My mind drifts back to a classic Clint Eastwood movie where he walks into a bar and orders a sarsaparilla. This unseemly act provokes the regular barflies, who inform Clint of his error. Clint is disrespectful in return and nearly gets shot. Then they try and run him out of town. Maybe he should have ordered a double whisky.....

"Root beer" is another American classic soft drink of shady origins. It was originally brewed from the roots of the sassafras tree. All was fine until it was discovered that sassafras is carcinogenic and bad for the liver. So in 1960 root beer got banned. This put the wind up root beer manufacturers and over a quiet sarsaparilla they wondered what to do. Before you could say "I feel like a Root Beer" it was reintroduced, but this time flavoured with sarsaparilla and liquorice - not sassafras. It's still called root beer but now it's essentially the same drink as the one we call sarsaparilla.

Try a root beer float, also known as a "black cow" or (in Aussie) a sarsaparilla spider. In a large glass, add sarsaparilla to ice cream. It's sweet, bitter, black and white all at the same time. A favourite of Dennis the Menace!

This is wonderful recognition for the whole BCR team who support the Bay & Basin region through In-Home Aged Care, NDIS, and Youth and Community programs and services.

CEO Heather Marciano said the award is an acknowledgement that while BCR Communities has evolved over the last 30+ years, they have stayed true to their mission, to partner with communities and provide person centred services for all.

"Even though we have grown so much, we have never lost that initial enthusiasm, commitment and community focus of the original residents who started BCR back in 1991." Heather said.

"Having a team of long-term, local staff and volunteers means BCR continues to have a deep knowledge and commitment to the local area and the needs of local communities".

An example of this is how BCR responded to the voice of local youth. With a higher than average youth unemployment rate in the Bay & Basin, BCR sought the views of local youth and knew that understanding their needs was an important step in finding solutions. Engaging with local youth as design partners helped BCR to successfully secure a \$558,000 Regional Youth Investment Program (RYIP) grant to build a dedicated Youth Space in Sanctuary Point.

"This PODS project will include a pop-up café where local young people can learn barista, hospitality and customer service skills, a meeting and training pod and a yarning circle. It will be a safe space for young people to improve their health, well-being, connection, creativity, and learning."



KILLARNEY'S TODD FAMILY

In the August About Monthly Feature, the progression of the village estate of Killarney was explored, from its beginnings in the earliest decade of the 20th century. The name of the village was changed in the middle decades of last century, apparently due to a confusion between all the localities that were named after the original placename in Ireland. In New South Wales alone, there were postcode localities at the local Killarney village (2540), as well as at Killarney Heights (2087) in Sydney's northern suburbs, and at Killarney Vale (2261) on the Central Coast. Interstate there was Killarney (4373) in Queensland, as well as a Killarney (3283) in Victoria. In addition to this, there were properties, streets and other roadways across NSW, as well as estates like the local one, all reflecting the strength of Irish heritage by those who named them

The change from Killarney as a placename may well have come about in the years shortly after the amalgamation of Clyde Shire Council in to the overall structure of Shoalhaven Shire Council in 1948. In Margaret Blair's book FROM BULLOCKS TO BYPASS (published in 2000), reference is made to a visit in 1946 to the Clyde Shire Offices at Tomerong by State MP for South Coast Jack Beale, and the Minister for Works and Local Government Joe Cahill. Both were accompanied by "members of the newly established State Electricity Authority.... Possible extension of the electricity supply to South Tomerong, Wandandian, Sussex Inlet, Killarnev and Hyam's Beach" was the purpose of this visit. That the Killarney placename was still being used in the early postwar period is consistent with the reminiscences of longtime Killarney/Erowal Bay resident Ray Southall, mentioned in the August About Monthly Feature KILLARNEY.

Ray wrote it was "either in the late 1940s or early 1950s.... when it was still Killarney".

Progress associations were a large part of community activities in this immediate post WWII period. Across the several dozen towns and

villages of the Shoalhaven that were emerging around this time, 15 progress associations existed until 1964 when a Shoalhaven Combined Progress Association was initiated by then newly elected councillors John Hatton and Harry Sawkins. They were assisted in forming this combined voice to Shoalhaven Shire Council by Edith Hollick, who was elected secretary of the S.C.P.A.

A decade before, a progress hall was first constructed in 1954 in Erowal Bay, in the years shortly after the name change from Killarney. The original form of the hall. Ray wrote, came about after a block of land in King George Street was 'donated' to the village progress association by Charles Bradbury, a grazier from Taralga on the Southern Tablelands. This came around after Bradbury purchased a waterfront block along Naval Parade, and Ray indicated his father Richie Southall may have persuaded Charles that he no longer needed the block of land for his own private use in King George Street. Ray thought that it was two other local residents Eric Bryce and Mr Harry Teague who acted alongside his father as guarantors before the work on building the hall was undertaken

At the time of his reminiscences, Ray Southall was able to remember over forty years of activities which had been conducted at Erowal Bay Hall. In his list of uses by the local village community, Ray included "meetings, dances (including a dance studio), housie and bingo nights (conducted by Shoalhaven District Ambulance, particularly during Christmas and Easter holiday periods, assisted by progress association members), movie film and slide nights, weekly indoor bowls, darts, card playing and euchre nights, Nowra T.A.F.E. conducted regular teaching classes in subjects such as cooking, arts, sewing, macramé etc. Local resident Di Laver was chief tutor at the cooking classes. There were church services, special parties, wedding receptions, Ladies Auxiliary meetings, charity fundraising sale days, not forgetting the hall's use as the local polling booth on election days." New Years Eve dances had



been held there, and Santa Claus had often arrived at the hall on Christmas Eve. Ray added that "if the walls of Erowal Bay Hall could divulge all they have heard over the years it would certainly be entertaining to listen to".

In 2014, a pictorial history of the SHOALHAVEN DISTRICT was produced by Roger Coombs. This contained images of the major areas of settlement at Berry, Nowra, Kangaroo Valley, Jervis Bay, Sussex Inlet, Milton and Ulladulla. These were accompanied by summaries explaining the details contained in the selections of photographs. At the outset, there were photos of some Aboriginal people and related places, as well as an image of a ship called Lady Nelson. Governor Lachlan Macquarie entered Jervis Bay aboard this ship in 1811.

On page 101 of this book, there are three photos of the Todd family at Killarney. They were mentioned in the August About Monthly Feature as purchasing a waterfront block in the first land sales which established that village estate. Now a man in his eighties, and a resident of Coastal Waters Retirement Village, Greg Todd remembers well the boatshed and holiday shack shown in two of these photos. In the other photo, circa 1911, there are two rowboat dinghies belonging to the family in the one photo by the shore. Both display their name of 'This El Do Me'. One of these has seven people sitting in the dinghy. Greg's grandfather William Todd is at the rear, while his grandfather's brother Harry Todd is at the bow of the dinghy. Just under him by the bow is Greg's father, also William Todd. All three men are dressed in suits and ties, with bowlertype hats. There are also three well dressed ladies seated in the dinghy, as well as a young girl.

Greg remembers well Mr Teague and his wife who are believed to have operated the first post office service for Killarney. This was located close to the waterside end of today's Kallaroo Road. Near this location, the Hazelton brothers conducted their business for many years as professional fisherman. Ray Southall wrote a full page description of the Hazelton's activities in a 1998 personal memoir.

Mr Teague was a World War I serviceman who was possibly assisted financially to set up the post office service with a veteran's allowance.

He and his wife performed this role until a sawmilling accident meant that Mr Teague was no longer able to complete these tasks. Bryce's General Store further along today's Naval Parade is believed to have continued the Killarney postal service for the most number of years after that point.

Ben Louttit was a prominent proprietor of Erowal Farm back then. He also transported many holidaymakers in a two horse sulky from the railway station at Bomaderry to their destinations. The Todd family he often delivered to Huskisson after they travelled on the train from Sydney. Here they would stay overnight before hiring a horse and cart for the family, for the rest of their journey to Killarney along the dirt bush track roads.

Rowing from Killarney across Erowal Bay to the wharf at the entrance to Worrowing Creek was common place back then. Sam Knudsen snr was President of the village progress association in its early years. He would row across this bay and back in the dark, in all weathers, to attend and preside over 'progress' meetings. He lived on the western side of Erowal Bay.

It was common for horses to be swum across Erowal Bay back then. Ben Louttit owned trotters named 'Tug' and 'Nugget'. They were used to deliver milk which had been produced by Ben's milking cows at Erowal Farm. The milk would be delivered to Killarney and nearby Bream Beach, as well as to the sprinkling of people living in the bushland and waterfront areas at Royal Park (now Sanctuary Point).

Greg Todd fondly remembers advice given to him by Ben Louttit in his childhood bush adventures, and helping to deliver milk to those areas. Ben's son Ted Louttit would shoe horses at Erowal as a self-taught farrier. He also used horses for timber getting away from Erowal; a practice he undertook in preference to using bullocks to haul these loads.

Possibly Greg's fondest childhood adventures were riding upon 'Tony the Pony'. After the horse had swum across from Erowal Farm to Killarney with Greg onboard, 'Tony the Pony' could be relied upon to make his own way home by swimming, even in the dark, back across Erowal Bay. As they say, the truth is often stranger than fiction.



Ask Questions While You Can

I hear it all the time..... "I wish I'd asked the questions while my relatives were still alive". The older surviving members of your family have all the information, but too often we are too busy, too preoccupied or too scared to ask, then as they pass away, this priceless information is lost forever.

Interviewing elderly relatives need not be daunting, (especially over a cuppa & cake) if you help them along with open questions, they are usually very happy to relive their memories, but you need to record these conversations if you can, so ask them if they mind if you keep a notebook ready to jot down the important details you won't find anywhere else. If they are reluctant to open up, try leaving a notebook with them for when they change their mind.

Here are some questions to help you start the memories to flow:

- Tell me about where you lived were you happy there? What games did you play as children? Were your parents strict? How did you and your siblings get on? Do you remember your grandparents? What do you remember about them? Did you know your great-grandparents? What do you remember about them and where they lived?
- What was school like? Did you have a favourite teacher? What was your favourite subject? Who were your best friends?
- Who was your first boyfriend/girlfriend, what happened to them?
- Tell me about your wedding day who was there? Did you have a big or small wedding?
- Tell me about your first job, how old were you? Did you enjoy going to work?
- · What other jobs did you have?
- What about Christmas, birthdays,

anniversaries - did your family celebrate? Were there any family traditions?

Photographs are always a huge help in jogging memories, so often there is no information with the photo, which raises many questions:

 Who are these people? What was the occasion? Where was this photo taken? What do you remember about the people in the picture?

If you are lucky enough to learn more about your family, record all the information before it is lost; write it up into a story, or type into a word programme, and leave it with your important papers for posterity – with luck somebody in your family will be interested and may even take up the family history challenge.

Can JPs Witness Documents from Overseas?

NSW JPs are not authorised under NSW law to witness the execution of documents for use overseas. This is because there may be requirements for overseas documents that are governed by overseas laws, rather than NSW law. In Australia, Public Notaries are able to witness signatures on overseas documents. For example, NSW JPs cannot witness:

• Overseas proof of life forms for claiming overseas pensions.

However, NSW JPs can:

- Witness the Commonwealth of Australia's Life Certificate form; and
- Certify copies of overseas original documents such as a birth certificate, if satisfied that the document is a true and accurate copy.

Can JPs Witness Wills and General Powers of Attorney? Any person over the age of 18 who is not a beneficiary of the will, or an attorney under that power of attorney, can witness a will.

If you do witness a will, we are not acting in our capacity as a JP (but as a general member of the public). As we are not delivering this function as a JP, we **do not** use our JP number.

Note: There are no circumstances where JPs can witness Enduring Powers of Attorney or Guardianship. They must only be witnessed by specially qualified witnesses such as solicitors and attorneys.

All the climate indicators point to a hot, dry spring and summer, an end to the saturating rain we have experienced for some time. However, Storm Season is approaching so you should be asking yourself a few questions:

- 2. Can water run away quickly from my property? Heavy rain may cause flash flooding. Is there anything that will prevent water running away? A new garden bed perhaps or a delivery of sand or soil?
- 3. Am I worried about trees or branches? We have many good arborists in the area who will advise you.
- 4. Do I have any loose items in the garden? A strong wind will pick up a sheet of roofing iron, plywood or similar and turn them into dangerous flying objects. Unsecured trampolines really enjoy a good fly around. Spectacular but not recommended
- 5. Can I cope with a power cut?
 - Portable radio and spare batteries
 - · Torch and spare batteries
 - · Drinking water and snacks
 - · Candles and matches. Keep them dry by wrapping in clingfilm
 - · Phone fully charged
 - · Emergency contact numbers

What happens in a bad flood and I must evacuate? Evacuation orders are issued by the SES in a flood situation. If there is a likelihood of being evacuated SES crews will be door knocking in the area. Information will be given about where to go. First preference is to go to family or friends.

Remember:

- Your medications
- Any important documents or valuables All stored in a waterproof bag or box.

Where can I get information? Weather warnings are broadcast on ABC FM 97.3 and local stations, such as 2ST. Also, the StGB Unit **f** that is regularly updated before and during events.

Anything else I could do?

- Protect your property. Before and during an expected bad weather event, sandbags will be available from the StGB Unit on Tasman Rd or at the SES Sussex Inlet Cache. located near the Community Centre, Thomson St. Information will be on social media
- Stay out of flood water. Remember kids, flood water may look fun but is contaminated with nasties. Stay out.
- Do not attempt to drive through it. As little as 30cm of running water can move a car. Your insurance company may not be very receptive to damage caused by driving through flood water!

If you have an **emergency** caused by storm, flood, or tsunami, call the SES emergency number 132 500.

longterm member of The Wool Road Spinners and Weavers is Denise, who wasn't going to be a weaver, as she wanted to just spin. However, after seeing someone doing what is called tapestry weaving, her weaving journey began, and what a journey it has been

Tapestry weaving is painting images by weaving yarns, a pictorial product rather than weaving patterns. As in most tapestry weaving, it is done on a simple loom, not a shaft loom. Denise was hooked. She began a craft textile course in Strathfield. She enjoyed it so much that she decided to complete the whole course over a number of years and later the Diploma of Art (Tapestry) at Warrnambool TAFE by correspondence.

Denise now does all sorts of weaving; sometimes using an 8 shaft table loom, a 24 shaft loom and an 8 shaft dobby floor loom. From these looms a weaver can generate patterns, some quite intricate.

Denise began weaving in the 80's. Her husband has said that if he knew what he did when he gave her the first spinning wheel, he wouldn't have given that present, however we are very grateful, as Denise brings much knowledge and expertise to the group. She also gives to the wider NSW community as she is a committee member of the Hand Weavers and Spinners Guild of NSW and often judges at Shows.

If you would like to see some of our work check out Wool Road Spinners and Weavers, or come and visit during one of our meetings.

The meetings are on the first and third Thursday of the month from 9.30am to 1pm in a classroom at Jervis Bay Baptist Church on the corner of The Wool Rd and St George Ave Vincentia.




